First things first

Register to vote:

- Go to: vote411.org/pflag
 - Check your registration status
 - If you are not registered – REGISTER NOW.
 - Find information about who is eligible to vote in Alaska.
- When you register you will be asked for your current address and ID Number (driver's license, state ID, or social security number).
- The voter registration deadline in Alaska is **October 6**.



Voter Identification

In Alaska, photo IDs are required to register and cast a ballot.

- If you do not have an acceptable form of photo ID you can vote.
 - You will need to provide a current utility bill, paycheck, government check or bank statement, or other government issued document with your current residential address.

Voting While Trans/Nonbinary

The state of Alaska does not provide any specific guidance for trans and nonbinary voters. Here are a few recommendations from Advocates for Trans Equality:

- Bring valid ID and backups (voter registration card, utility bill)
- Share the #VotingWhileTrans guide with poll workers
- If needed, connect with a volunteer attorney on-site or call the National Election Protection Hotline (866-OUR-VOTE)
- Worst case, request and cast a provisional ballot and be sure to ask for follow-up instructions

Voting While Living With a Disability

- You can have a personal representative pick up and deliver a ballot to you if you're unable to vote in person due to age, illness, or disability. They must return the ballot before 8pm on Election Day.
- Alaska allows curbside voting for those who are unable to enter the polling place.
- Alaska provides Voting Tablets at every polling place that can provide a magnified, high contrast, and audio ballot. The Voting Tablet offers an audio ballot in English, Yup'ik, Inupiaq, Koyukon, Gwich'in, Spanish, and Tagalog.

Absentee voting or voting by mail

Vote by mail.

- Alaska does not require an excuse for absentee voting.
- Voters must request their absentee ballot by October 26.
- You can request an absentee ballot here: elections.alaska.gov/voter-information/absentee-and-early-voting/
- Your absentee ballot can be hand delivered on election day.
- In Alaska an absentee ballot must be postmarked by Tuesday, November 5 and received by Friday, November 15.



Alaska requires your signature on your absentee ballot be witnessed by someone 18 years of age or older. They must also sign the return ballot envelope and provide at least one identifier.

PFLAG recommends that voters request their absentee ballots as soon as possible and get them in the mailbox no later than Tuesday, October 22.

Early voting

Vote early.

- All registered voters in Alaska can vote early for any reason.

- Early voting begins in Alaska on October 21 and ends on November 4.
- Voters who plan to vote early in Alaska are required to have identification. Learn more here: elections.alaska.gov/absentee-and-early-voting/




Getting Out The Vote

Voting on Election Day:

Vote on election day.

- Polls open in Alaska at 7am and close at 8pm on Tuesday, November 5.
- You can find information about the location of your polling place here: vote411.org/pflag
- If you arrive and are told you won't be allowed to vote:
 - Don't panic. Ask why, fix any problems, ask about same day registration, request a provisional ballot, etc.
 - Call 866-OUR-VOTE or 888-VE-Y-VOTA.
